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We Are Not Having Kids

Yesterday my wife pointed out a post online by an acquaintance of ours that disparaged the fact that some young couples get married and decide not to have kids. He stated that it was because of selfishness that they were deciding not to have kids and implied that this was against Biblical teaching. Is he right? Are those who get married required by God to have children?

We must first consider where, if any place, in the Bible, we find a command, either direct or inferred, that instructs the married to produce offspring. Although there are many verses in Scripture that speak on the subject of both marriage and parenting the only place that suggests a requirement for procreating is **Genesis 1:28**, "Then God blessed them, and God said to them, 'Be fruitful and multiply; fill the earth and subdue it.'" We must ask ourselves if this command is still applicable to us today, or if it was only for certain people at a certain time as was the Law of Moses. The first thing that we should realize is that this command has already been fulfilled. It would be hard for someone to honestly say that the earth has not been filled with people and that we are not the masters of it. Second, we must realize that it is not possible for everyone to follow this command. Some, whether by choice or circumstance, never get married and some who do get married are not able to have children. Since there is no partiality with God (**Rom. 2:11**), we can know that God would never give a command that people could not follow.

There is also the fact that marriage, and subsequently the production of children, is not always the best choice that a Christian could make. Paul states in **1 Corinthians 7** that because of the present distress (i.e. persecution) they were suffering that it would be better to remain unmarried if you were already single. If we understand that certain circumstances make it prudent to remain unmarried, then, because having children goes hand in hand with marriage, we can understand also that there would also be certain circumstances that would make not having children prudent as well. It may be that the health of the woman or the potential child could be a concern. It may be that the parents are concerned about bringing a child into the world knowing the hardships it would face, imagine a young couple in present-day Ukraine. It may be that they know that children would take away from their time and resources and decide to devote those to God instead. Maybe the couple is too old to have kids. If the command is universal, then age shouldn't matter.

The objection that was raised about parents not wanting children was that these people were being selfish. Since we can see that not having kids is not sinful in and of itself we must conclude that it is selfishness that is the problem and not the lack of children. By Will Vann

My Neighborhood

He held children in his arms, went home with tax collectors and sinners, and encouraged the hearts of the down-trodden. He told the disciples that to see Him was to see God. And that's how others see God in us.

We are often stilled by our belief that God is looking for big things in us. Sure, there are big challenges we must meet, but most of life is not about big things. It's the little things we routinely do to others that opens their hearts and shows the beauty of God's grace in us.
