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God's Foolishness Vs. Man's Wisdom

Listening to a podcast recently I heard a man who claimed to be an agnostic say that even though he didn't believe in God he understood those who did. He said that others feel like they need God because of not being able to cope with things like death, but he had no problem with facing death so he didn't need God. Even though he didn't come out and say it he implied that others were weak-minded and needed the crutch of religion to get through life. He on the other hand had it all together, he didn't need something outside of himself to rationalize the trials and storms of life. Man is wise, God is foolish.

The apostle Paul would have at one time sympathized with this thought. Not that God was foolish perhaps, but that man was wise and could have it all to gather. A man could take what God had provided then turn his back on God and make a success of himself both physically and spiritually. That was until he was confronted by Christ! After his conversion, which resulted in a complete 180, he would come to understand a powerful truth. God is always far above man.

"For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved, it is the power of God. For it is written: 'I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and bring to nothing the understanding of the prudent.' Where is the wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the disputer of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of this world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world through wisdom did not know God, it pleased God through the foolishness of the message preached to save those who believe. For Jews request a sign, and Greeks seek after wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified, to the Jews a stumbling block and to the Greeks foolishness, but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. Because the foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men" (1 Cor. 1:20-25).

In man's 'infinite' wisdom, he decided that he did not need God, or at least the God of the Bible. Some want to see something great others want to hear something great. As long as it tickles the ear it will be popular. In elementary we used to have show-and-tell where you would bring something from home, the more unusual the better, and show it off to the rest of the class. The goal was to bring something they had never seen before while you showed off your superior knowledge. The problem was, however, even if you brought the most gloriously awesome gadget ever and you received your 15 minutes of fame it would then be all over. You could not bring the same thing twice, it just didn't work. You needed something different, something better if you wanted the same result next time.

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God's Foolishness Vs. Man's Wisdom

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The Hebrew writer tells us that Christ is "the same yesterday, today, and forever" (Heb. 13:8). He is unchanging and not really that spectacular if what we are looking for is outside stimuli. However, if you are in need and realize that the 'wise' things that man offers are just not cutting it, then Christ, who was always the answer, is there. Like the woman in Mark nine with the flow of blood who had spent all her livelihood on man-made solutions when we come to Christ, we can be healed. I am not speaking of the miraculous, but the spiritual. Many today are bleeding out spiritually and do not know where to turn. They are told that man has all the answers all you have to do is pick your poison. In the end, though, that is exactly what it is poison. Christ provides abundant life (Jn. 10:10) through His gospel which has the power to save (Rom. 1:16). The question is, will we risk being foolish before men so that we might partake in the wisdom of God?
